Field School

Every student in the MNGD program has the opportunity to learn in and explore a northern region outside Canada. Between March 23 and April 2, the most recent cohort of MNGD students travelled to Northern Norway where they discussed such

topics as indigenous research methodologies, traditional land uses and their development, and socio-economic variations in the Arctic.

The students will apply their learning to their applied research projects to be conducted in Northern Saskatchewan communities.

International Connections

Food Security Network

Centre Member Karen Tanino, lead of the UArctic Thematic Network on Food Security, is working with the ICNGD on food security, solar greenhouse technology, and sustainable energy sources for northern communities. The group is also partnering with the Buffalo Narrows Economic Development Corporation to examine the possibility of a biomassheated greenhouse.

As part of her work in this area, Dr. Tanino was in Akuyeri, Iceland this winter meeting with the other UArctic Thematic Network member leads.

ICNGD hosts Russian delegations

The ICNGD hosted a delegation from Russia's Northern Arctic Federal University (Arkhangelsk) March 4-6 and a separate delegation from the North-Eastern Federal University (Yakutsk) March 16-20.

Both visits were productive and resulted in the establishment of frameworks for future collaboration.

Outreach Activities

Representatives of the ICNGD and U of S named the winners of the ICNGD New Logo Contest at Churchill Community High School (La Ronge, SK) during a special midday presentation on March 28, 2012. The contest was an opportunity for secondary and post-secondary students in northern communities to create a logo that they believed captured the North's essence as well as represented the ICNGD's work.

The ICNGD new logo, unveiled at the event, has a shape that represents coniferous trees, northern lights, and the shape of Saskatchewan. The eight segments depicted are symbolic of the Arctic Eight countries, representing the ICNGD's international connectivity in working in partnership to create something whole. The idea of forward-moving education and research and development is represented through the dynamics of the visual, illustrating free-flowing thoughts, dynamic ideas, and the movement in the North towards increased capacities and a more prosperous future.

Longtime Centre Member Ken Coates has recently landed at the University of Saskatchewan and, in addition to his role as Canada Research Chair, he has assumed the position of Co-Director, Research at the ICNGD. We are thrilled to welcome him aboard!

Ken is a well-known historian specializing in the history of the Yukon and Northern Canada in general, who has written many books both for academic and trade audiences. Tamara considers herself a northern Indigenous person, with her home community of Yakutsk located in northeastern Siberia.

Her northern roots are what drew her from across the globe to enroll in the Master of Northern Governance and Development (MNGD) program.

"This master's program is a great opportunity for any northerner to better understand our homelands and the current and future issues of the whole circumpolar world. The North matters and this program recognizes the value of Northern people—our vision and spirit."

Being able to speak her Indigenous language, Yaukut, as well as Russian, English and some basic French also helped with her decision to live and study in Canada. She will graduate this year, and plans to remain in Saskatchewan.

"I am hoping to work for an Aboriginal organization here in Saskatchewan, because being indigenous from the Siberian part of Russia, Aboriginal issues are close to my soul, and here one can see the emergence of something new—hopes, ideas and approaches infused with Aboriginal wisdom and spiritual content."

Tamara currently holds a Bachelor of Arts in Economics with a specialization in international finance from Northeast Federal University (Institute of Finance and Economy) in Yakutsk, Russia.
